




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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT ARCHIVAL INDICATORS

What are *archival indicators* and why are prevention service planners using them?

Archival indicators are simply data collected routinely, often for several years, by human service organizations for planning, accountability and monitoring purposes. Most of this data is produced by public agencies and non-profit human service providers. Self-report survey data, collected directly from community members using questionnaires, is generally not considered to be archival indicator data.

How can this information assist partnerships in planning for alcohol, tobacco and other drug (ATOD) prevention services?

Researchers at OASAS and in several other states have tested archival indicator data for its ability to predict levels of ATOD related problems in communities. These studies have found that certain indicators may be used to help monitor levels of risk and protective factors that are predictive of greater ATOD abuse. They can also provide information on the consequences and costs to communities due to substance abuse. Together with student survey data, focus group data, other survey data and prevention resource assessments, these risk indicators are part of the foundation of a comprehensive community needs assessment. The completed needs assessments will guide prevention partnerships in preparing strategic plans for their communities' prevention services.

Why can't prevention partnerships use the OASAS PRISMS county level risk indicator data?

Many communities are smaller than counties and must use sub-county data to assess their needs. Partnerships also need to know where within their counties risks are greatest. Fortunately, OASAS has recently produced a zip code level risk profile for New York City that can provide much of the required data for the NYS SICA sites. The PRISMS County Risk Profiles will be produced again in Spring 2001 (with 1997-98 data) and should be used to compare communities with their county, regional and NYS rates. Many prevention partnerships may be able to collect important data that is not available at the state level, such as hospital Emergency Room usage rates or substance abuse related-child abuse cases. Some indicators, such as adolescent suicide rates, will be too infrequent to use at a zip code level and others may occur frequently but only in a small number of zip codes.

Isn't this work very complex and best left to researchers like demographers or epidemiologists?

Yes, collecting and interpreting this data can get very complex, but luckily many prevention partnerships have access to Universities or research consultants that have experience with using this type of data. Others have found help through their partnership members. There is also an excellent guide to collecting and using this data: "A Community Substance Abuse Indicators Handbook" produced by the Institute for Health Policy at Brandeis University and Join Together.

This guide is written for prevention partnership members and gives several examples of how this data has been collected and used successfully by partnership members across the country.

Some of the disadvantages of archival indicator data for risk assessment:

- Reflect activities of social institutions - not population norms or behavior
 - tend to reflect dysfunction (good for risk but not protective factors)
 - reflect policies and budgets: traffic patrols up - DWI rates up
- Not easily tied to many prevention strategy outcomes
 - no peer data, no attitudes data, no bonding data
- Government administrative data can be of poor quality
- Data sources vary by geography: census, zip, city, and county, police precincts, health districts, community boards...

Some of the advantages of archival indicator data for risk assessment:

- Easy to understand-intuitive
- Objective - no sampling or self-report biases
- Available from Family/Youth serving institutions
- Lower costs to collect than new data
- Long time frame is good for prevention – can monitor long term trends
- Can be readily tied to social costs: arrest, incarceration, health care, addiction treatment

How do we start this effort?

The Communities that Care[®] planning system has organized these indicators by scientifically validated risk factors. OASAS research staff have added additional indicators tested in New York State and removed some indicators that can only be used at a county or higher level of aggregation. Combining these two sources, this guidebook for indicator data collection is organized by risk factors into a “wish list” of indicator data for prevention partnerships to pursue.
